The course offers golf schools, private lessons and a junior golf league serving more than 100 young golfers each summer. Black Brook also offers a variety of leagues for men, women, coed, couples and juniors.

Mentor Community Recreation Center

The new Mentor Community Recreation Center will open to the public on July 1, 2023. The 128,000 sq. ft. facility is one of the largest facilities of its kind in northeast Ohio and includes an indoor soccer field; basketball, tennis, racquetball, and pickleball courts; indoor and outdoor swimming pools; cardiovascular and weight training areas; group exercise rooms: a childcare room and other amenities.

Members can also enjoy a variety of year-round activities including aquatics; fitness and wellness; sports; infant and preschool; youth and teen; adult; older adult and family programs.

Family and individual annual membership plans are now available beginning for both residents and nonresidents.

A resident is defined as a person who lives within Mentor city limits. Family members must live in the same residence to qualify for family plan rate. Memberships can be paid in full or through a payment plan. Single-day admission is also available for \$10.00 per person.

"We needed something to do," wrote Ann Beck in 1977, about becoming one of the first members of the brand new Mentor Senior Center in 1973.

Having something to do, and people to socialize with was the impetus for a facility that would offer a variety of activities for those who didn't look, feel, or act their age of 55 and older. And that remains the greatest part of the mission 50 years later.

In those early days, activities were held at Mentor Beach Park in Mentoron-the-Lake, a scenic 13-acre park with a two-story lakefront pavilion. Back then, there was no Laketran bus service, so a hired driver would pick up members who couldn't drive and bring them to the facility. As memberships grew, so did its locations. In 1978, the center moved to the old Ohio Bell building on Prospect Street before it outgrew that space as well, and it be-

came clear that the popular recreation center would need a larger and permanent home. And so, a 22,000-squarefoot building was erected on Center Street and opened in 1995, much to the delight of all the "recycled teenagers"— a phrase coined long ago by a former president of the advisor board.

The only thing that hasn't expanded much through the years is the annual membership fee, which is still affordable to everyone. Currently Mentor residents can join for just \$10 per year. Nonresidents are welcome as well at \$15.

Today, the Mentor Senior Center, the largest of the Lake County centers with over 4,000 members, is a thriving meeting place that keeps the older generation active, informed and entertained with a fitness center, billiards room, computer room, kitchen (with daily lunches), library, main hall with stage, and an inviting lobby and reception area that features a double-faced fireplace.

Fun, Friends and Food

"I'm here every week," says Kathryn Foxx, 82. "I use the elliptical machine for my arthritis and always take part in the Classic Silver Sneakers program. I especially enjoy chair volleyball, which you'd think would be boring, but it

sure isn't!"

Foxx, a retired Lake County court reporter, joined the center with her husband, Norb, in 2015. "We did many things here together, and when he passed in 2018, I kept coming because I meet a lot of people, and now I have most of my meals here because they're delicious and I don't have to cook for just one person."

The lunches have always been a big hit, not only for its appetizing menu, but also nutritional value and reasonable prices. The "made-from-scratch" entrees, sandwiches, salads, soup, and desserts, are available weekdays from 11:30 AM-12:15 PM. The daily specials are just \$5.

But it's the activities that are the longstanding draw. You can stay active with fitness classes such as stretch and balance, yoga, low impact aerobics, and line dancing, or relax with arts and crafts, or get a group together for a game of pinochle or bridge. And yes, there's always bingo.

Since its inception five decades ago, it's no surprise that members are now multi-generational, like Gwen Giddings' family. "My mother, Colletta Knight, started going there in 1999," recalls Giddings, who is 88. "She played a lot of games there and enjoyed many of the classes. She didn't

drive, so she'd hop on Laketran. In 2001, she got a kick out of being in the Better in Mentor parade where she sat on an old-fashioned rocker on the float," she says with a laugh. "She was a great card player too."

Giddings adds that she often volunteered in the kitchen with her mother

before joining after retirement. She's now a regular at the center. "I come on Tuesdays and Thursdays for my art and ceramic class and exercise classes, and on Wednesdays for lunch." Now her daughter, Brenda Smolen, a recently retired RN, is an active member as well and enjoys the exercise classes and a quilting class she takes with her mother.

For those who prefer to exercise or engage in other programs at home, the center's online classes, which became popular at the onset of COVID-19, remains a welcome option.

Oh. The Places You Will Go!

Aside from the more than 100 different courses offered each year, there are always opportunities to travel through the Mentor Senior Center. "We're always adding more trips every year, and there's something for everyone," says recreation director, Renee Ochaya, adding that many opt for day trips. "Some seniors love going out but they like being close to home so we take them to Cleveland Guardians

games, the downtown theaters, and wineries, which are always fun."

The center has its own "tour bus," which enables easy drop-offs and eliminates often exorbitant parking fees. For longer journeys, they partner with a tour service. "We're excited to resume our big trips again," Ochaya says, referring to pandemic shut downs. "Last year, it was Rhode Island, this year, the Smoky Mountains in Ashville, North Carolina, and next year, we'll be going to Alaska."

"I love every aspect of my job," says Ochaya, who's worked at the center for 15 years. "I especially enjoy interacting with these seniors who are just a delight. Dave Duricky (recreation coordinator) and I serve the special lunches together and it's such fun chatting with them. It means a lot to us at the center that we are adding to their quality of life."

That mindset apparently goes hand in hand. "I have so many fond memories of the center through the years," Giddings says. "As I get older, I realize how much I've gained from being a part of it."

The Mentor Senior Center is located at 8484 Munson Road and is open from 8 AM-8 PM Mondays and Wednesdays and from 8 AM-5 PM on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. To register for any program, call (440) 974-5725, or simply stop in!

CRAZY ABOUT PICKLEBALL!

Pickleball is a paddle sport that combines elements of tennis, badminton, and ping pong. It is played on a smaller court with a solid paddle and a perforated plastic ball. It's easy to learn and accessible to people of different ages and skill levels.

The sport has been around since the 1960s but has recently exploded in popularity and is now the fastest-growing racquet sport in the country.

About a decade ago, the city recognized the growth potential of this activity and started converting some of their

Civic Center tennis courts into pickleball courts. Today, they have 15 courts at the facility which makes it one of the largest complexes in the region.

Courts are open from sunrise to 10 PM and available on a first-come, first-served basis except during scheduled tournaments. The courts are a hive of activity with players arriving throughout the day so there is always someone ready to play.

History of the Game

After playing golf one Saturday during the summer, Joel Pritchard, congressman from Washington state and Bill Bell, successful businessman, returned to Pritchard's home to find their families sitting around with nothing to do. The property had an old badminton court so Pritchard and Bell looked for some badminton equipment and could not find a full set of rackets. They improvised and started playing with ping-pong paddles and a perforated plastic ball.

At first they placed the net at badminton height of 60 inches and volleyed the ball over the net. As the weekend progressed, the players found that the ball bounced well on the asphalt surface and soon the net was lowered to 36 inches. The following weekend, Barney McCallum was introduced to the game at Pritchard's home.

Soon, the three men created rules, relying heavily on badminton. They kept in mind the original purpose, which was to provide a game that the whole family could play together.

Not unlike bigtime football games on Friday nights, shopping centers with something for everybody, or the national historic site of President James A. Garfield, manufacturing is among the first things people associate with Lake County's largest city.

"Manufacturing is the backbone of the Mentor economy," said Kevin D. Malecek, director of economic development and international trade for the city of Mentor.

There's no surefire way to account for everything that is made in Mentor, but the breadth of that list is impressive. The labels found on the beauty products in your cabinet? Manufactured here by Avery Dennison. How about the antireflective coating for the visors Tom Cruise wore in the cockpit in the 2022 film Top Gun Maverick? Created in Mentor by North American Coating Laboratories (NACL).

The city is home to 1,700 businesses, and nearly 20 percent of them are manufacturers. That's the sixth-largest amount in the state, according to the city's Department of Economic and Community Development. The city has 11 industrial parks and nearly 8,000 acres of land that is zoned for manufacturing. Mentor manufacturers are making great use of that space, with product shipments exceeding

\$2.5 billion annually.

"Mentor is a growing community of manufacturing companies from low to high technology and could not be more welcoming and helpful with opportunities to grow your business," said Brian Wilson, president and CEO of NACL.

Since Mentor's 1963 incorporation, a variety of successful manufacturers like Libra Industries, Fredon, and De Nora Tech have flourished after opening, renovating, or relocating to Mentor. Still, it takes more than a rich history to attract firms that could take their talents anywhere around the state, country, or world. Kenneth J. Filipiak, Mentor's city manager, knows success does not happen by chance, "Our entire administration and city council work hard to create a climate where businesses of all sizes feel they have a partner in the city that values them and will work to meet their needs. It's not just lip service. The success of our community relies on a strong economy, especially our manufacturing segment."

On the brink of its 50th anniversary, NACL moved from Highland Heights to its Mentor location at 9450 Pineneedle Drive. The firm started out by primarily providing coating for eyeglasses, sunglasses, and mir-

rors, but now that represents just 15 percent of NACL's work, Wilson said. The company has been focused on developing products for autonomous vehicles, machine vision and robotics, augmented and virtual reality technologies, and space exploration. "Our customer base could be one of the most diverse in the world—we work (with everybody from) the mom-andpop optical shop down the street in Mentor where you get your eyeglasses prescription filled, and I've also put on presentations in the boardrooms of Tesla, SpaceX, Google, and Apple," Wilson said.

Manufacturers like NACL have relocated to Mentor because of its

reputation for helping them grow. The size of the economy and services provided to manufacturers provides both a built-in customer base and convenient partnering opportunities. Mentor also offers very creative performance-based incentives and grants, and works hard to connect businesses to regional, state, and federal sources to help identify growth capital. But it's the personal touch that makes the biggest difference.

"We do try to be very business-friendly, in terms of helping manufacturers start up and making linkages and connections for them," Malecek said. "I think it's really all those attributes, starting with that rich history we've had here. But history is not going to mean anything for a manufacturer without what's happening at the present."

Wilson agrees after joining Mentor city representatives on an international trade mission. "They were very strategic in helping me get contacts and meetings that I probably would not have been able to get otherwise," Wilson said. "They got me to the right people in these large organizations that I could speak to about our services. All of this was basically a direct result of the introductions that the city of Mentor made for me."

Mentor is one of the only cities in Ohio that has an international presence. Since 2015 the city has grown its International Trade Initiative, which is highlighted by an annual trip to Europe to promote Mentor as a potential place for companies to set up U.S. operations and to promote companies in Mentor as potential partners. NACL accompanied the city this past year, and in Scotland, where Wilson met with representatives from local chambers of commerce. The visit was so successful that it inspired Wilson to open an NACL European sales office in The Netherlands. He later secured a spot in Electro Optics' inaugural "Photonics 100" list of the 100 people driving the photonics industry forward. Wilson will also go on a similar trip with the Mentor group to Ireland this summer and NACL will be an exhibitor in a couple of European trade shows.

A recent success from the program is the company Bloc Digital, a digital technology company located in Derby, United Kingdom, in the process of establishing an office in Mentor. Its owner, Keith Cox, was introduced to Mentor through a presentation city representatives gave at a local chamber of commerce meeting. Although interested in a U.S. presence, they had not established a clear timeline. After the chance encounter, a conversation began.

"It wasn't on our agenda, but it was the right time, right person, right meeting," Cox said. "As we talked, Mentor seemed to be the ideal place because we had grown our company in the UK in the Midlands, surrounded by industrial and engineering businesses. A tech company is often located down in London, and in the States,

it might be in Silicon Valley. But our clients are not in Silicon Valley — our competitors are. Our clients are in places like Cleveland and Mentor."

Bloc Digital uses its immersive digital technology studios to create bespoke digital visualization, augmented and virtual reality, web, and mobile marketing solutions for manufacturers and industrial clients. Cox and business partner, Chris Hotham, launched its Derby operations in 2000 and have enjoyed servicing a roster of blue-chip companies like Shell, Rolls-Royce, Lubrizol, and Siemens. Mentor's infrastructure, proximity to clients and universities, and its cost of living ultimately made it the best choice.

"It's really cost effective to set a business up there ... yes, we could be anywhere in the world, but it's affordable, clients are there, and it's in the middle (of the U.S.), so you can go left, right, down, up when you need to travel," Cox said.

Infrastructure is always a big draw for Mentor, Malecek said. The presence of CSX and N&S rail service, access to Interstate 90, and the Cleveland Hopkins International and Akron-Canton Regional airports mean Mentor manufacturers are located within about 500 miles of half of the nation's population. Mentor is also about 18 miles from the Port of Cleveland, which handles more than 13 million tons of containerized and noncontainerized cargo per year with an express route to Europe that connects the Great Lakes to the Port of Antwerp.

Cox envisions Bloc Digital growing incrementally to 26 employees eventually, but for now he is continuing to make local connections and looking to hire a manager.

"They've been nothing short of amazing to put it bluntly," Cox said of the city. "They've hosted us, set us up with all the contacts we'd need, colleges, universities, the chamber, you name it. They're our one-stop Rolodex."

The future of manufacturing in Mentor looks even brighter thanks to the efforts of groups like the Alliance for Working Together Foundation

(AWT), an organization focused on the workforce of tomorrow. In the last year, AWT opened its Transformation Training Center on Tyler Boulevard. With the latest and best equipment, they are working with Mentor High School and other educational partners to train the next generation of employees entering the manufacturing workforce on the hard skills they will need to meet the growing job demands.

Said City Manager Filipiak, "our staff does an excellent job of business recruitment, but we need more young people to understand the tremendous benefits of a career in manufacturing to fill our growing needs. A manufacturing renaissance is underway in Ohio that will succeed if fueled by a talented, ample workforce."

"I think that investment in the future of our workforce and workforce development is essential and that's something else that kind of keeps that vibrancy in this sector going and makes us a place where you want to be," Malecek said.

Local business leaders like Wilson at

The AWT Transformation Center will provide training and pathways for northeast Ohio's collective skilled manufacturing labor force and serve as a hub for workforce development for the region. The AWT Foundation has partnered with area manufacturing companies, and county, state, and federal legislators to provide training for skilled manufacturing jobs.


NACL are excited to see the next wave of manufacturers come to Mentor. Whoever they are and whatever products they make, Wilson knows they'll receive ample assistance from the city.

"They provide a lot of resources that if companies take advantage of them, it can be very fruitful for them," Wilson said. "When I first moved here, I never thought I'd be traveling with the city manager and the economic development director looking for ways to help me grow my business and mutually be a spokesperson for the city of Mentor,

saying, 'hey, we're a great place to live, to work, and to set up a manufacturing facility.' We work together and for mutual benefits."

Keeping Residents Safe

Mentor offers three programs

A variety of programs are available for Mentor residents who may require additional care during an emergency. Please take a moment to compare the different programs to see which one may be right for you.

Lock Box Program

The Lock Box Program enables fire/ EMS/police personnel to gain access to your home in case you can't reach your door to open it for them during an emergency. The program provides a secure lock box that can only be accessed by fire/EMS/police personnel by using a special key. No tools or drilling required for installation. Simply hang it on your door. One-time fee of \$35.00.

Resident Information Address Flag

A notation or "flag" is placed in our Computer Aided 9-1-1 Dispatch System (CAD) to make Mentor police, fire and ambulance aware of any special medical needs, emergency contact information and/or lock box/hidden key information you would like them to be aware of if they are called to your residence in an emergency.

Well Check Database

In the event of a long-term power outage or other large-scale emergency, enrolled residents will be checked on by emergency services personnel by phone first, then in person if unable to be reached by phone. This program is designed for Mentor residents who need electricity for medical needs (i.e. oxygen) and/or for people who are living alone, elderly or disabled and do not have any family or friends to check on them during a large scale emergency or long term power outage. Please note that this is NOT a daily check-in service.



The Lock Box Program can save precious seconds if safety forces need to enter your home during an emergency.

Ohio Staying Connected Program

This service is provided by the Ohio Department of Aging and will provide a daily call, during the same one-hour time period every day, to a qualified participant in the program. These will be automated calls. If no one answers the call, the program will call the alternate contact person, if one has been selected by the participant. If the program is unable to contact the participant, or leave a message with participant's alternate contact person, the program will notify participant's local nonemergency service.

Any Ohio resident age 60+ who would like to be checked on with a daily phone call can enroll in the service.

Mentor A Great Place

to Call Home

ver the years, Mentor has been named among the best places to live by local and national news outlets. Using indicators such as safety, education, housing, public services, diversity, and walkability, this "City of Choice" consistently scores high. It's also among the 12th "Happiest Places in Ohio," based on median household income, low crime, and divorce rates.

Then again, to those who have resided in Lake County's largest city, these accolades come as no surprise.

"My husband, Mark, and I lived in Mentor from 1990 to 2001, and just loved it," recalls Susan Schervish. "When we moved to another city for closer proximity to work, we found that we didn't care for the isolation of the houses and soon wanted to get back to the neighborhoods of Mentor and all the city has to offer."

Among the many things the city has to offer are great housing options. Mark and Susan have been rehabbing houses for years and they know that Mentor appeals to every walk of life. "It's pretty amazing the variety of houses there are here," Schervish says. "Not only that but you can find a house that meets any budget, and compared to some other suburbs in northeast Ohio, you can get more land too."

When the couple moved back to

Mentor in 2004, they vowed to never leave again. "We found the perfect house here, and our daughter loved attending Mentor High School," she says. "We try to take advantage of all the amenities, such as the paved bike paths, the lagoons, variety of parks, and soccer fields. Best of all, we happily discovered that it really doesn't take much longer to commute to work because the access to the freeways is an easy hop on, hop off. So yes, we're here for good."

Finding the Perfect Mentor Home

One of the biggest decisions in life is where to live and there are a number of factors to consider when searching for the right house. What you might be looking for in a starter home as a single person can be quite different than if you've already established your family, and different still when you're looking to downsize in your retirement years. Style of homes are a wide-ranging choice in Mentor, too. You can choose from condos, ranches, split levels, colonials, Cape Cod styles, newly constructed contemporary designs, or even century homes.

Jacob Vitale recently purchased his first home at age 23. "I wanted to live in Mentor because it has the best access to stores and gyms, and close proximity to family and the freeway, making it

easy to commute to Cleveland where I work," says Vitale, who is a chemical engineer. "I wanted a house in a nice, safe location that can be turned into a home."

"Mentor is definitely a popular place to live because there's a great lifestyle to be had here," says Amanda Alafi, real estate agent at Home Smart in Mentor. "The value of the homes are very good and so are the schools."

According to Realtor.com, home values in Mentor have risen 5.1% over the past year, with the typical home averaging around \$289,900. It's been a seller's market for some time and that's often the case in this lakeside city.

"People move here to raise their family and often just stay because there's really no reason to leave," says Alafi, who has been a licensed agent since 2017. "So there's a bit of a housing shortage because there isn't a lot of turnover. Oftentimes there are less houses to consider for the amount of people who want to move here."

Because of that, some who want to live in Mentor opt to begin by renting a home. Houses to rent in Mentor start at about \$900, which is fairly reasonable compared to other cities.

While the Schervish family moved away from Mentor only to return, many Mentorites never left. Generations, in fact. "My mother moved here in 1943, raised all seven of us kids here and my father had his own business here as well, J&N Cycle Shop," says Annie Felice Kline. "I've never even considered moving away, not even when I attended Ursuline College."

It Really Is Better in Mentor

Once you find the right house and school for your family, the fun really begins. Whether your interests include hiking, biking, swimming, golfing, shopping, dining, basking on the shores of Lake Erie, observing wildlife, or taking in your favorite music outdoors, Mentor has it covered. With over 170 eateries, the city has a restaurant to please every palate. It's a shopper's delight as well, with over 300 retailers ranging from big box retailers to cozy mom-and-pop establishments.

There are plenty of ways to enjoy nature as well. Headlands Beach State Park is Ohio's largest natural beach and attracts hundreds of thousands of visitors each year. The dunes are a major birding destination and serves as the northeast terminus for the 1,400-mile

Buckeye Trail.

Nearby Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve & Marina includes 11/2 miles of shoreline, winding wooded paths, and a brand-new marsh-rim boardwalk and observation deck. Canoes, kayaks, paddle boats, and pedal boats are available for rental during the summer months.

Mentor is rich in history as well. The first presidential library established in the U.S. is located in the James A. Garfield National Historic Site, which is commonly referred to as Lawnfield. The historic Wildwood Cultural Center & Park, located at 7645 Little Mountain Road, is a cultural gem consisting of 34-acres of stately trees and scenic gardens that is a beloved location for events and photographing special moments. The 1908 manor house is one of the earliest versions of

the English Tudor Revival style in northeast Ohio, and has been on the National Register of Historic Homes in 1981. The facility is used year-round for a number of programs and workshops, and is available for rent by the public for social and business functions.

The Amp has been compared to a "mini-Blossom" and features a 3,000 square-foot stage, 35,000-watt sound system, and two 14' x 7' video screens. Nearly 6,000 music lovers converge each week to enjoy top touring tribute acts as well as special performances by national recording artists which have included Lita Ford, Gin Blossoms, Darryl Worley, Everclear, Soul Asylum, and Cracker, just to name a few! Admission and parking to Mentor Rocks is free.

What's New in Mentor?

Mentor has a legacy of forward-thinking city councils that have worked hard over the years to make Mentor a great place to call home through thoughtful acquisitions as well as new business attraction. The 52-acre Springbrook Gardens Park now includes the 4,400 square foot Springbrook Gardenhouse. The much-anticipated state-of-the-art Cleveland Clinic Hospital is opening this summer, as is the new Mentor Community Recreation Center. And, more is on the way to keep Mentor a vibrant and inclusive community for all.

"I think the biggest appeal is that Mentor offers so much at every stage in life," notes Susan Schervish. "Whether you have kids, no kids, are young or a senior, whatever your interests may be, Mentor really does have it all."



The Birds and the Bees

How to make your yard eco-friendly

Perhaps you've wondered how you could make your yard eco-friendlier or perhaps how you could reduce the number of mosquitoes. There is a two-in-one solution—plant a native pollinator garden.

Our yards are usually devoid of taller native vegetation and shrubs that help soak up standing water. This creates stagnant areas where water can sit and attract mosquitos to lay their eggs. Also, turf grass provides next to no value to our native birds and bees, which are vital in pollinating our native plants.

Section off part of your yard where you can plant native wildflower seeds. Adding a nice border with stone can help keep this area looking neat.

We recommend prairie mixes that include common and butterfly milkweed, black-eyed Susan, purple coneflower, and aster species. These flowers attract monarchs and other butterflies.

which are important pollinators in our ecosystem.

Adding a flowing water feature can also help attract species of dragonflies, especially if your yard gets a lot of sunlight. The best thing about dragonflies is that they eat a lot of mosquitos!

Having a pollinator garden with a water feature is a sure way to attract them.

Birds also eat mosquitoes and other biting insects. Adding structure in the way of native shrubs will be sure to attract species such as eastern bluebird, eastern phoebe, Baltimore oriole, and yellow warbler to your yard.

For smaller shrubs that provide berries, look at black chokeberry, common serviceberry, or winterberry.

If you want to add color to your yard and benefit pollinators, choose flowering dogwood, buttonbush, or redbud.

Most importantly, make sure the plants you choose are native to Ohio,





and aren't invasive species native to Europe, China, or Japan.

Cleveland Clinic Mentor Hospital opens its doors to the community

A message from Richard D. Parker, MD, President of Cleveland Clinic Mentor Hospital:

I want to welcome you, the members of our community, to your new hospital.

When Cleveland Clinic designed a hospital for the city of Mentor and the surrounding areas, we focused on the needs of those com-

munities' residents. The result is what I would describe as a "hospital of the future" that will serve patients' needs – not only today - but for generations to come.

But before I tell you about the hospital, I want to recognize that the most important aspect of Mentor Hospital is the people who will be providing care for your families. Mentor Hospital is a brand-new facility, however, the caregivers running it are an experienced team.

Mentor Hospital will be managed by Cleveland Clinic Hillcrest Hospital, allowing for easy access and staffing between facilities. Many Mentor Hospital caregivers have worked for years at other Cleveland Clinic locations. In addition, experienced caregivers have recently joined Cleveland Clinic to work at Mentor Hospital where they will be able to provide care in their own city for the first time in their careers.

Some physicians from Hillcrest Hospital and other locations will provide services at Mentor Hospital. When patients schedule with one of these providers, they can stay at their current location or be seen at Mentor Hospital.

Cleveland Clinic has served the residents of Lake and Geauga counties for many years from offices in Chardon, Concord, Madison, the Mentor Wayside Building and at the Willoughby Hills Family Health Center. We will continue to provide care at those facilities.

Mentor Hospital gives us the opportunity to provide a broader range of care for Lake and Geauga counties. The hospital features 34 inpatient and observation rooms, four operating rooms and 12 pre- and post-anesthesia care beds. Mentor Hospital services include cardiology, urology, bariatric surgery, general and colorectal surgery, vascular surgery, pulmonary medicine, orthopaedics and sports medicine, lab and imaging services.

Thanks to feedback during our design process from local fire and EMS leaders, the Emergency Department - which is Mentor's first - includes the addition of a drive-through canopy. This will provide EMS teams and patients with some cover in the winter months.

Mentor Hospital serves patients who have shorter hospital stays with follow-up care at home, based on their less critical



needs. If patients need more acute or specialized care, they are transferred to the appropriate Cleveland Clinic location, such as Hillcrest Hospital, Euclid Hospital, or main campus.

The first thing you will notice when you enter Mentor Hospital is the stunning artwork in the atrium. We know that visiting the hospital can at times be a difficult experience, so we use art to provide beauty and calm for our patients and caregivers. Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve and Marina

The 450-acre lakefront property is one of Mentor's natural gems!

The 230-acre nature preserve includes 1½ miles of shoreline with rare dune plants, a riverine marsh and mature oak bluff. Located on the western boundary of the 691-acre Mentor Marsh State Nature Preserve, the preserve contains the greatest diversity of wetland communities within the marsh basin, and serves as an important breeding and nursery area for fish and waterfowl and an extremely popular resting place for neotropical birds and butterflies as they migrate each year.

The preserve is a part of the Lake Erie Birding Trail. Mentor Natural Resources specialists host a number of programs all year round including an important banding program which helps track migrating species.

A new ADA accessible boardwalk and observation deck was recently

completed near the parking area and offers magnificent views of the marsh. A 90-foot tower is currently being designed with construction anticipated next year.

On the marina side, visitors can rent kayaks, canoes, paddle boards, and pedal boats. Construction of a new concession building will begin later this year.

Mentor Public Schools provide career tech education

Mentor Public Schools is a suburban school district that serves more than 7,600 students from prekindergarten through twelfth grade from the city of Mentor, Mentor-on-the-Lake, Concord Township, and Kirtland Hills. Mentor Public Schools operates seven elementary schools, two middle schools, and one state-of-the-art specialized school for students with autism.

Like many school districts, Mentor Public Schools has long offered career technical education in fields including criminal justice, culinary arts, HVAC and welding as potential career paths. But Mentor's program stands out above others in growing local partnerships to provide expertise and resources to help prepare students for a variety of in-demand jobs that meet pressing needs in their community.

Partnerships with Lakeland Community College and with businesses and community organizations can provide college credit, hands-on training, and credentials in high-demand fields to Mentor's students. In fact, Mentor's career tech program is something that attracted Mentor Public Schools Superintendent Craig Heath to the district from Central Ohio nearly a year ago. "What our students learn here will help them more easily step into these roles upon graduation," Heath noted.

One such career tech program is the Fire EMT Academy. This cutting-edge program was developed in collaboration between the Mentor Public Schools and the Mentor Fire Department to help attract future applicants

to meet the need for firefighters and EMT applicants not only in Mentor, but in communities around northeast Ohio.

The course also gives students the opportunity to earn EMT-basic certification and credentials necessary to fill open jobs at the Mentor Fire Department. Now in its second year, the Mentor Fire Department has already made a hire from this program.

Another successful collaboration is in the area of automotive service technology. The program was designed in partnership with Classic Automotive, Inc. which provided the facility and hands-on training for students in the district's classroom.

"Classic had trouble hiring trained automotive technicians," shared Kristen Estes, director of communications at Mentor Public Schools. "The hands-on training students receive in our auto service program not only provides them with valuable, in-demand training and skills, but the opportunity to be hired on after graduation."

Heath noted that the district applied for a grant through the Ohio Department of Education to set up an IT and cybersecurity CTE program.

"We'll set up this innovative learning space with the latest and greatest technology equipment, so our kids can really dig into that field," Heath explained. "This program will afford students in Mentor the skills to jump into this rapidly growing career."

The district is working to tap into local trade unions, as well. Heath is optimistic that a collaboration with the Electrical Workers labor union could result in a career tech electrical pre-apprenticeship program; a similar trade program in plumbing is also under discussion. "There are such great opportunities in these fields right now," Heath noted.

Officer shortages highlight the need for more criminal justice training, something Heath sees as a career tech opportunity to help get highly qualified students into the police academy sooner.

"It's one of the strengths of being a big district in a big city," Heath noted. "We have the opportunity to affect other communities who lack the resources we have." He concluded, "How can we take care of our own, but also help the northeast Ohio community?"

Laketran extends service hours for Local Routes and Dial-a-Ride

Laketran recently announced new hours of operation for its Local Routes 1-9 and door-to-door Dial-a-Ride service.

Laketran now operates Monday -Friday from 5-9 PM and Saturdays from 8 AM-7 PM with new hourly service. Route 9 that serves Tyler Boulevard now operates on Saturdays,

By increasing service hours, Laketran's goal is to support local businesses, as well as social and cultural events through the community, by providing more access for people who rely on public transportation.

"The new hours will give employees reliable transportation to get to work at 6 AM, but also provide seniors and people with disabilities opportunities to enjoy evening events, like concerts in the park or dining out later than 7 PM at night," said Laketran CEO Ben Capelle.

Capelle shared that Laketran surveyed manufacturers along Tyler Boulevard in Mentor and learned 61% of the businesses operated earlier than Laketran could get employers there.

"We need our routes to start at 5 AM, so employees can begin work at 6 AM, explained Capelle. "Our manufacturing industry provides a significant amount of jobs in Lake County and these businesses are struggling to find people to fill their jobs. This is one way Laketran can help businesses and impact our local economy."

Residents that rely on Laketran's door-to-door Dial-a-Ride service, primarily used by seniors and people with disabilities, will also benefit from the extended hours.

"Previously, our last reservation window for Dial-a-Ride trip was 7-7:30 PM and it will now be 8:30-9 PM," said Capelle. "We know senior isolation is rampant and we hope to

Nonmedical In-Home Care Program helps seniors stay in their homes

Seniors living in Lake County who need assistance with personal care, bathing, meal prep, light housecleaning, laundry and other essential tasks have an option for assistance if they meet eligibility requirements. The Nonmedical In-Home Care Program, administered through the Lake County Council on Aging, currently has several openings available for seniors, 60 and over.

Nonmedical care can significantly improve a senior's ability to maintain independence and allow them to continue to live in the comfort and security of their own home. This program is designed to provide support to Lake County seniors who are not eligible for traditional Medicaid-based programs and cannot afford to pay privately for the care they need. The program is funded through the Lake County Senior Services Levy and is administered at no cost to eligible seniors.

"The collaboration between the social workers at the Council on Aging and the home care agencies offers a unique support system for seniors aging in place and their families," said Danielle Phillips, program manager. "It not only gives families peace of mind that immediate needs are being met, it also provides a system prepared to address future needs as they arise."

By 2030, one in three individuals residing in Lake County



will be 60 years of age or older. This program is just one of several programs put in place by the board of Lake County commissioners in their continued effort to position the county to handle the increasing senior population.

Participants must meet income verification guidelines and have an assessment completed by a social worker from the Council on Aging. The Council on Aging has contracted with three local home care agencies that provide hands-on care and support to seniors enrolled in the program. Eligible seniors are assigned to a home care agency promptly after the social work visit.

The room smells amazing. The scent of baked apples intermingles with warm brie and roasted potato leek soup.

The room rings with laughter, compliments and questions about recipes.

It's a potluck between pals, food and friendship. It's also a book club.

Mentor Public Library's Cookbook Club launched in January 2023. Every month, its members pick a cookbook. Then each person makes a recipe from it, and they share their dish with the rest of the club. The room is always packed.

The Cookbook Club may be new, but it's emblematic of Mentor Public Library. It involves books, sure. But just as importantly, it connects people.

The library creates connections for its patrons - to resources, to ideas, and to the rest of the community.

You can see people connect at the library every day – in clubs, after story times, during evening lectures, and along its storybook trail.

But the library connects people in more subtle ways too. It hosts dozens of story times at community preschools and brings books and movies

to homebound patrons with its Words on Wheels program.

The Mentor Finance Department's is responsible for accounting for the city's financial transactions. This includes, day-to-day budget administration, payment of bills, preparation of payroll, maintenance of capital asset records, receipt of monies, municipal income tax enforcement, auditing, debt administration, city insurance, and reporting the city's financial condition.

It's a lot to keep track of and we're proud to state that the department has received the GFOA Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting award for 38 consecutive years!

We get a number of

questions from our residents regarding finance. Here are some that are most frequently asked.

What is the income tax rate in Mentor?

The city of Mentor has a flat 2% municipal income tax for all residents and businesses with a taxable income, and for all persons earning income within the city.

Where does this money go?

Nearly 2/3 of the city's operating budget is supported through income tax and nearly 2/3 of that is generated by people who work in Mentor but live elsewhere.

These funds help support our safety forces, road repair programs, parks and facilities, programs, and much more.

Do I have to pay income taxes if I live in Mentor but work in another city?

Mentor residents are required to pay a 2% municipal income tax to the city of Mentor if they have any earned income, including lottery winnings, or rental income. Some cities offer a reciprocity and if they are taking city taxes out for their city, you will get credit for the 2% due to Mentor. It is still mandatory for all Mentor residents to file a city income tax return if you have any earned income.



What if I live in a different city but work in Mentor?

Individuals who live in a city that collects municipal income tax may have Mentor taxes coming out of their paycheck; but as stated above, some cities offer a reciprocity for working in another municipality. Individuals who live in a township, village, or anywhere where city taxes are not collected will have Mentor taxes taken out of their paycheck, but they are not obligated to file an annual city tax return with the city of Mentor.

Does the RITA office still have a location in city hall?

The Regional Income Tax Agency (R.I.T.A) no longer has an in-person office located in Lake County.



Emergency

For help in an emergency including police, fire, or emergency ambulance - dial 9-1-1.

When you dial 9-1-1, the call is answered at the Mentor Dispatch Center, where the address and phone number from where the call originates will automatically appear on the dispatcher's screen.

A dispatcher answers the call by saying "9-1-1, what is your emergency?" State the problem or emergency first, and then give the location of the incident.

The dispatcher will start the fire and/or police departments en route while obtaining additional information from the caller.

Stay on the line until the dispatcher tells you to hang up.

ORDINANCES & PROGRAMS

This summary of selected Mentor city ordinances and programs includes those areas and issues that are most commonly encountered by citizens. The complete Mentor Code of Ordinances can be viewed at cityofmentor.com; click on Ordinances under the "About Mentor" tab.

Animals

Households in residential districts may not have any more than three dogs over the age of four months. Dogs should be leashed at all times when outside. Owners must not permit their dog to bark or howl so that it disturbs the peace. All dogs over three months must be registered with the Lake County Auditor and wear a valid registration tag.

Animal bites should be reported to the police department within 24 hours. Owners of both dogs and cats are responsible for picking up after their pets, both on public and private property. Contact the warden's office at 440-350-2640 to report stray dogs. Hunting is prohibited within city limits.

Dead Animals

Contact Public Works at 440-974-5781 weekdays between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m.; other times, call the Police Department at 440-974-5789.

Exotic and Wild Animals

Keeping any undomesticated animals, including primates other than monkeys, poisonous reptiles, alligators, lizards over two feet long, etc. is restricted. A complete list of wild and exotic animals is available at citvofmentor.com. click on Ordinances under the About Mentor tab.

Farm Animals

Farm animals are not permitted on premises less than two acres in size. These include horses, goats, cows, chickens, ducks and similar animals.

Additional zoning requirements may apply. Call 440-974-5740 for specifics.

Nuisance Health Risk Animals

Feeding or harboring of deer, rats, raccoons or skunks is prohibited.

Vicious Animals

Keeping dangerous or vicious animals is prohibited.

Bicycles

The Mentor Police Department offers citizens a no cost bicycle registration program that helps to identify a bike's rightful owner if the bike becomes lost or stolen. When riding on a road, cyclists must follow the traffic laws and ride WITH traffic. Bike paths are to be shared by pedestrians and bicyclists. Bike lanes are exclusively for bicycles, unless there is no sidewalk or shoulder.

Building Permits

Those looking to access construction permits and related documents, schedule building inspections, submit applications, and other city services, can now do so through the Mentor Gateway online at www. thementorgateway.com.

Building permits are required for all construction including decks, pools, sheds, porches, enclosures, etc., and must be obtained through Mentor's Engineering & Building Department. Applicants for accessory-type structures need to provide two copies of the construction drawings, consisting of a site plan showing where the structure will be situated on the property, and the distance from all property lines. Plans must also show how the structure will be built, materials used, etc.

Once submitted, the plan review process takes about five working days (permits for sheds built from a kit can be obtained at the time of submission). A permit fee is charged, along with a refundable construction deposit, which can be returned if the structure passes all inspections.

Both building permit and zoning permit applications are required for all construction projects including (but not limited to): additions, decks, garages, pools, fences, siding,

sheds, porches, driveways and enclosures.

For accessory buildings 200 square feet or less, only a zoning permit is required for review and approval by the Department of Planning and Development. If the accessory building is larger than 200 square feet, a review by both the Building Department and the Planning Department will be required. Applications for any new building or structure include two copies of the construction drawings and a site plan that indicates where the structure will be located on the property. the size and height of the structure, and the distance from all property lines. Plans must also show how the structure will be built (materials used, etc.). Once submitted, the review process takes approximately 7 to 10 working days. A permit fee is charged, along with a construction deposit, which will be refunded if the structure passes all inspections. When a permit is issued, work on the project may begin.

Cars for Sale

Vehicles that are for sale in residential districts must be titled to the current resident, properly licensed, operable, displayed for a maximum of two weeks and parked on an improved parking surface (not on the lawn). The number of vehicles for sale is limited to two per year.

Curfew

Children under 12 are prohibited from being outside between 9:30 pm and 5 am; children 12 to 16 years old between 11 pm and 5 am, and 16 to 18 years old from midnight to 5 am. A new daytime curfew restricts school-aged children from being out of school during regularly scheduled school hours, unless accompanied by a parent or legal guardian, or the child has an authorized written excuse.

Drainage Ditches

All premises shall be graded and maintained to prevent the accumulation of standing water. No owner or occupant of any premises shall cause or permit any natural water-

course, drainage ditch, creek, brook, culvert, or drain located upon the premises to become obstructed with leaves or other debris so that water flow is hindered. Call 440-974-5785 with questions.

Fences

A permit is required if you plan on installing, altering, or relocating a fence. Fences in the rear vard of a residence must not exceed six feet in height. Fences in the front yard or on a corner lot facing a side street may not exceed three feet in height and must be decorative and at least 50 percent open.

Garage Sales

A permit is not required; however, sales are limited to three per year and no sale shall exceed four consecutive days. Garage sale signs are permitted only on the property where the sale is being held. Signs may NOT be posted at any street corner or on tree lawns or utility poles. Illegally posted signs will be confiscated by the City without notice.

Garbage & Recycling

Garbage cans, recycling containers, bulk items, and yard waste may only be placed at the curb after 3 pm the day before the items are to be collected.

After collection, garbage cans, recycling bins, and yard waste containers must be retrieved from the curb by 7 am the day after your collection.

During the fall, the yard waste restriction does not apply beginning on the weekend immediately preceding the fourth Monday in

October through Friday of the second full week in December in any year of city-sponsored yard waste collection.

Grass and Weed Control

Generally, grass in residential neighborhoods must be controlled in height and kept less than eight inches. No owner or occupant shall permit vegetation to create a safety hazard.

Property owners with excessively high grass or weeds will be given 48 hours from receipt of notice to comply with the ordinance. If compliance is not met, a city crew will be sent to cut the grass or weeds of any unoccupied properties and the property owner will be billed. Occupied properties in violation will be prosecuted in the Mentor court. Call 440-974-5792 with questions.

Home Occupations

Any business conducted out of a residence requires one of two types of permits. One permit is administratively approved, while the other requires approval by the Municipal Planning Commission. Call 440-974-5740 with questions.

House Numbers

House numbers must be displayed in a conspicuous location in order to ensure efficient police, fire, and postal services. Numbers, no less than four inches tall, are to be displayed on houses less than 61 feet from the road right-of-way. Numbers at least six inches tall are to be displayed on houses located between 61 feet to 100 feet from the road right-of-way.

Income Tax

All persons earning income in the city are subject to a two percent municipal income tax. Mentor residents must file an annual municipal income tax return with the Regional Income Tax Agency (RITA); retired persons can file an exemption to show no earned wages. Residents are granted 100 percent credit for city income tax paid to other communities. If you have questions, call 800-860-RITA.

Jogging

Joggers are encouraged to pursue their recreational activity of choice in a safe and responsible manner, and to follow these rules:

- Jogging upon a roadway is illegal if an accessible, adjacent sidewalk is provided.
- Where a sidewalk is not provided, jog only on the shoulder of the roadway, as far as possible from the edge of the roadway.
- Where neither a sidewalk nor a shoulder is available, jog as near as possible to the outside edge

of the road; if it's a two-way road, jog ONLY on the left side. Any joggers on a roadway shall yield the right of way to ALL vehicles.

Light Trespass

High intensity density (HID) lighting must have full cut-off fixtures or be shielded to prevent trespass or glare. All spot or flood lighting must be shielded or aimed to prevent light trespass. Call 440-974-5792 with questions.

Mosquito Control

The Lake County General Health District oversees mosquito control during the summer months. Spraying schedules are posted on The Mentor Channel as they become available.

If you have concerns, call the Health District at 440-350-2543.

Noise

No person shall unreasonably create a noise disturbance within the city. Any noise that annoys or disturbs a reasonable person, or

causes adverse effects on humans, is prohibited before 7 am or after 9 pm weekdays, and before 8:30 am or after 9 pm on Saturdays and Sundays. Call the Mentor Police Department at 440-255-1234 to report disturbances.

Open Burning

The burning of trash, brush, or leaves is not permitted. Small, attended cooking campfires are permitted during favorable weather conditions without prior approval. Bonfires require prior approval of the Fire Prevention Bureau by calling 440-974-5768.

Parking

Overnight street parking between the hours of 2 to 6 a.m. is prohibited. Parking on the fire hydrant side of the street is prohibited. Parking on any city street whenever there is more than a two-inch accumulation of snow or ice is prohibited.

• Motor Vehicles – In residential districts, motor vehicles must be parked on an improved surface.

PROHIBITED: Batteries, broken/bare CRTs, any light bulb, carbon monoxide detectors, gas-powered equipment, hazardous waste, materials containing liquids, devices containing liquid mercury (thermostats, switches, medical devices, thermometers), PCB-containing materials, propane tanks, radioactive materials, and smoke detectors



Parking cont'd

Improved surfaces are those constructed of concrete, asphalt or permeable pavers, without excess weeds or grass.

- · RVs, Boats, and Dual-Axle Trailers – RVs, boats, and dual axle trailers may not be parked in front of the main structure. A minimum three-foot set back is required from side property lines. On corner lots, no RV, boat, or dual axle trailer parking is permitted between the right-of-way and side of the main structure. Parking must be on an improved surface of concrete, asphalt or permeable pavers.
- Commercial Vehicles No more than one commercial vehicle per dwelling unit may be parked on a residential property. No vehicle, having a net total weight of greater than 10,000 pounds, shall be parked on a residential property. Parking must be on an improved surface of concrete, asphalt or permeable pavers. No construction equipment or vehicle (includ-

ing, but not limited to, backhoes, bulldozers, trenchers) shall be parked in residential districts for more than 30 days.

Property Maintenance

Property owners are required to maintain the exterior of their premises so that its appearance does not negatively impact the immediate neighborhood. All residential rental properties must be inspected every two years. If you are renting an apartment or house, and you feel the property is not properly maintained, call the Code Enforcement Office at 440-974-5792.

Refuse Collection (Commercial & Industrial)

Commercial and industrial rubbish haulers collecting in the city of Mentor are required to obtain a contractor's license and vehicle permit.

Satellite Dishes

Satellite dishes are permitted in rear yards only and must be at least 10 feet from the side and rear

property lines. The maximum height permitted is 12 feet; the maximum diameter is 10 feet. A permit is reguired. Dishes less than one meter in diameter (39.37 inches) do not require a permit. It is recommended that the smaller dishes be located in the rear yard. DIRECTV and DISH residential units are exempt.

Sidewalks and Driveways

Property owners are required to keep their sidewalks and driveway aprons within the public right-of-way in a proper state of repair. If cracked, defective, or uneven, they must be repaired or replaced. A sidewalk inspection and maintenance program is ongoing. Property owners or persons responsible for the premises shall keep the sidewalk(s) adjacent to such building in a clean condition at all times (this includes clearing the property's sidewalks of snow and ice, per Ord. 521.06).

Signs

"Home for Sale," "For Sale," and "Garage Sale" signs are permitted only on the actual property where the sale is taking place and only when posted behind the tree lawn. Similar signs are not permitted off-premises and will be confiscated, without prior notice, when observed by the city. (See "garage sales.")

Snow and Ice Control

- Clearing of City Streets Arterial and major collector streets are given first priority for snow and ice control. All major intersections on the major arterial highway system are salted and/ or cindered, along with certain hills and bridges. Residential neighborhoods are cleared when conditions warrant. Call 440-974-5781 with routine snow and ice control inquiries.
- No Parking During Snow Emergency – A snow emergency is when there has been an accumulation of more than two

inches of snow, sleet, hail, or ice on any streets/roads. No parking is permitted on city streets during a snow emergency.

- Depositing Snow & Ice on Public Sidewalks or Roadways - Depositing snow or ice onto any public sidewalk, street, road, or highway is not permitted.
- Access to Fire Hydrants Property owners are urged to adopt the fire hydrant closest to their property to keep the hydrant clear from snow during the winter months.

Solicitation

It is unlawful to solicit without first obtaining a solicitor's permit from the Mentor Police Department. It is unlawful to solicit at any premise at which a "No Solicitors" sign is displayed. "No Solicitors" signs are available from the Mentor Police Department.

Trees on Right-of-Way/ **Tree Lawn**

- Dead Trees No owner or occupant of any premises shall permit a dead tree to stand near to a public sidewalk or roadway as to endanger users should all or part of it fall. No owner or occupant shall permit a dead branch to overhang a public sidewalk or roadway.
- Planting & Removing of Trees The city of Mentor has specific ordinances which property owners are required to follow when trimming, removing and planting trees within the right-of-way or tree lawn. Call Public Works at 440-974-5781 for details.

Traffic Signals/Signs

Traffic signals and signs are installed and maintained by the Public Works Department. For service requests, including repair or replacement of these devices, call 440-974-5781. Emergency or weekend repairs should be reported to the Mentor Police Department at 440-974-5789.

Yard Waste Collection

The city offers weekly curbside vard waste collection from the first full week of April through the second full week of December. Residents can set out 12 units per week on their regular trash day. The limit increases to 25 units from the last full week of October through the second full week of December. A unit is a paper yard waste bag, a 32-gallon can, or a bundle of sticks. CITY DEPARTMENTS

Office of the City Manager

The city manager serves as the chief executive officer and safety director and is responsible for planning, organizing, and directing the activities of all municipal operations.

The city manager appoints all department heads and employees; ensures that laws and ordinances governing the city are faithfully enforced; recommends to the city council measures or actions which appear necessary or desirable: recommends municipal ordinances and regulations; implements policies established by city council; prepares and submits to council the administrative budget and capital improvement program; and performs other activities as provided for in the city charter.

The city manager is appointed by city council for his expertise, education, and prior managerial experience. The following divisions are part of the city manager's office:

- Human Resources Oversees employee recruitment, selection and testing; employee safety, training and development; labor relations; employee compensation and equal employment opportunity; and processing of accident and injury reports.
- Information Technology Provides technical support services to city departments including application design and development, post implementation support and training, process analysis, technical consulting and project management.
- Public Information Responsible for disseminating information to the general public related to city projects, events, activities, and services through various means including press releases, newsletters, publications, city website, social media, apps, advertising, The Mentor Channel, and Mentor Radio 1620.

Clerk of Council

The clerk of council is appointed by city council members to keep its records and perform all duties as prescribed by the council.

Planning & Development

Responsible for establishing a diversified economic base with an emphasis on retention and expansion of existing firms, while attracting growth-oriented industries.

Provides staff to the International Trade Program. Oversees day-to-day development concerns and long-range land-use planning issues.

The department assists in administering the Federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, provides staff support to the Municipal Planning Commission and the Board of Building & Zoning Appeals, issues sign and fence permits, and prepares reports and studies dealing with land use, rezoning, subdivision and site plans, conditional use permits, signage, etc.

The department is also responsible for addressing property maintenance issues and administration of the multi-family and single-family rental inspection programs.

Engineering & Building

The department engineers and administers the city's capital improvements, regulates private utility work within the public right-of-way, and inspects building construction for community standards to promote the safety of homes and buildings. The department has two divisions:

- Engineering Directly involved with all utility and publicly or privately funded roadway construction in Mentor, both in reviewing and approving the construction plans, and inspecting the construction work performed. It is also involved with planning future public improvement projects, storm drainage assistance, municipal architectural design, and traffic control.
- Building Involved in all activities associated with residential and commercial building construction, including reviewing plans for conformance with building codes and performing on-site inspections to monitor building-code compliance. Helps with building-related concerns.

Finance Department

The finance department keeps accounts of all city financial transactions. This involves day-to-day budget administration, payment of accounts, payroll preparation, and maintenance of fixed asset records, receipt and investment of monies, municipal income tax enforcement, auditing, debt administration, city insurance, and reporting the city's financial condition.

Fire Department

The fire chief organizes, directs and coordinates all fire resources. to accomplish the mission of saving lives and community property.

 Fire and Rescue Division – Provides lifesaving and property protection including: the handling of fires, rescues, medical and sudden mechanical emergencies, hazardous materials and natural disasters. Services are provided from five fire stations staffed 24 hours a day.

Fire Prevention Bureau –

- Enforces the fire safety code and the ordinances of the city through routine inspections of businesses, industries, schools and shopping centers for the purpose of reducing the chance of fires. Also reviews all plans for new construction and investigates the causes of fires.
- Training and Public Education The training division provides continuous in-service and specialized training for members of the fire department as well as conducting home exit drills, evacuation planning, accident prevention, first aid, CPR and fire extinguisher training. The division also provides educational programs through schools, businesses, community organizations and civic groups, and works with the Fire Prevention Bureau on juvenile fire setter counseling programs.

Law Department

The law director is the adviser to, and the attorney and counsel for, the city of Mentor, its officers and divisions. The director and his staff represent the city for prosecutions for offenses against the ordinances of Mentor and the relevant Ohio laws. The law director is appointed by city council and is an attorney-at-law, admitted to the practice of law in the state of Ohio.

Municipal Court

The Mentor municipal judge tries all misdemeanors and ordinance violations occurring within the cities of Mentor and Mentor-on-the-Lake. Mentor Municipal Court hears traffic citation cases, civil cases valued up to \$15,000, landlord/tenant cases and all small claims complaints valued up to \$3,000. All felony cases are heard to determine probable cause and then bound over to the Lake County Common Pleas Court. The Court Probation Department oversees all persons placed on probation by the court for any offense.

Parks, Recreation and Public Facilities

This department enhances the quality of life for residents through the development and maintenance of a diverse and comprehensive system of parks and recreational facilities. The department's areas of responsibility include: recreation for youth, teens, and adults; operating and maintaining municipal pools, ice arena, Black Brook Golf Course and Practice Center, senior citizens center, Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve & Marina, Wildwood Cultural Center several community centers; cemetery operations; facility rentals; and maintaining city facilities and parks.

Police Department

The chief of police organizes, directs and coordinates all police resources to serve Mentor citizens.

- Communications Center Receives information and requests from the public and dispatches calls to police and fire personnel.

working relationship with citizens.

- Corrections Provides for the safety and security of the Mentor jail and the care of inmates.
- Detective/Juvenile Bureau Responsible for follow-up investigations of all major felony crimes that occur in the school district. Lake County Juvenile Court and other youth service organizations in the community.
- Patrol Services Bureau Responsible for the protection of life and property, the preservation of peace, repression of crime, apprehension of criminal suspects, prevention of delinquency, traffic direction and control, accident investigation, and traffic law enforcement.
- Records Bureau Provides information to support the police department and assist the general public.
- · Victim Assistance Program -Serves victims of crime through information, crisis intervention. referrals and court advocacy.

Public Works

Responsible for the construction and maintenance of city streets: the maintenance and operation of the storm water infrastructure system and the city's traffic signal system; the management of the city's fleet of vehicles and equipment; the city's waste collection programs, and the maintenance and improvements of all municipal public lands, urban forestry and street trees.



BOARDS & COMMISSIONS

More than 50 residents volunteer their expertise and input to city officials through their participation on city boards and commissions.

These citizens are appointed by city council and represent a valuable resource by making recommendations on various municipal issues.

Board of Building & Zoning Appeals (BZA)

The seven-member board hears and determines appeals for exceptions to and variations from the city's zoning and building codes to ensure that they remain in harmony with municipal ordinances and regulations. Members serve four-year terms. Members meet the second Tuesday of each month at 7 pm at the municipal center. Agendas are posted at cityofmentor.com.

Civil Service Commission

Ensures that consideration for appointments and promotions within the police and fire department's classified service are made according to merit and fitness, based on competitive examination. Three residents serve four-year terms.

Community Arts Commission




