

Crisp, clean air, beautiful colors and falling leaves are some of the hallmarks of Autumn in Northeast Ohio.

In Mentor we are fortunate to have over 1,200 acres of parkland to enjoy year-round. While fall color usually peaks in mid-October, to really appreciate the transformation we invite you to explore our parks over the entire season. One week you'll notice warm yellows giving forest paths and woodland trails a golden hue. In visits to follow, warm yellows give way to fiery reds and brilliant oranges. It's not only a feast for the eyes, but all the senses. Experience the sound of the leaves underfoot as you traverse the trail and the sharp, pungent smells of earth as cools from summer heat and prepares for the coming winter.

So where are the best parks to immerse yourself in autumn color? Here are our five favorites!

Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve and Marina, 8365 Harbor Drive. With over 450 acres to explore this park is a must see in fall. The upland forest contains a wide variety of hardwoods that lends itself to an ever-changing color palette throughout the season. With an extensive trail system, you can meander through the forest experiencing nature's beautiful colors. The new boardwalk located near the trailhead offers a commanding view of the marsh. It's truly not to be missed!

Veterans Park, 5730 Hopkins Road. Owned by the City of Mentor and managed by Lake Metroparks, the wooded park is nestled around Granger pond, the largest inland pond in Lake County (34 acres). A 1.78 mile loop trail encircles the pond affording gorgeous views of fall foliage reflected in the water. See it from the trail or venture out on the fishing pier for an amazing 360-degree view of the surrounding trees. Don't forget your camera!

Wildwood Cultural Center, 7645 Little Mountain Road. Comprised of 34-acres, Wildwood is one of Mentor's true cultural gems. The stunning 25-room English Tutor manor house is surrounded by mature trees. A wide trail beckons hikers to walk in the cool forest, kicking up an abundance of fallen maple, oak and beech leaves, while shimmers of sunlight break through the brilliant leaves that remain on the trees.

Eleanor B. Garfield Park, 7967 Mentor Avenue. This 65-acre park is in the heart of Mentor and is among our most popular parks for recreation due to its many baseball fields, tennis courts, playground, and as the location for the City's popular Farmers Market. What sets it apart in fall is the 5-acre fishing pond which offers beautiful backdrop for family photos. The park is open between dawn and dusk - visit early when the mist is rising off the pond and the fall colors are reflected in the still water. It's a view you won't forget.

Civic Center Complex, 8500 Civic Center Boulevard. You may ask what special autumn view is to be had at the Civic Center? The complex is home to many to the City's facilities like the Municipal Center, Police Station, Mentor Civic Amphitheater, Pool, and Mentor Ice Arena. While many trees surround the buildings, the real view is down the Civic Center Bike Path which winds its way from the park near the Ice Arena to Hopkins Road. Bike or walk down the path lined with the colors of fall.

BONUS: Mentor Cemetery, 6881 Hopkins Road. Rich fall colors underscore the stoic atmosphere of Mentor's historic cemetery. The memorial promenade offers a place to reflect on the sacrifices made by those protecting our nation.

### **OPEN BURNING**

Burning trash, brush, or leaves is not permitted in the City of Mentor. Small, attended campfires for cooking purposes are permitted during favorable weather conditions without prior approval. Bonfires require approval from the Fire Prevention Bureau by calling (440) 974-5768.

### **FALL YARD WASTE**

Starting October 1, the amount of yard waste homeowners are permitted to put out each week increases from 12 to 25 units. A unit is one bag, bundle, or container of yard waste. If you have questions about the Yard Waste Program, call the Public Works Department at (440) 974-5781.

### **HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DROP OFF**

Lake County residents can drop off Household Hazardous Waste at the Lake County Fairgrounds on Saturday, September 21 from 8 AM to 2 PM. Accepted items include bulbs and batteries, household cleaners, lawn and garden chemicals and more. ## **DEAD ANIMAL OR DEBRIS IN**

If you notice a dead animal or debris in the road please let the City know. Call the Public Works Department at (440) 974-5781 from 7 AM to 4 PM. Call the Police Department at (440) 255-1234 at all other times.

### **BURNED OUT STREETLIGHT?**

First Energy is responsible for maintaining streetlights, but if you notice a burned-out streetlight, you may call Public Works at (440) 974-5781. Please have an accurate description of the location of the pole. The outage will be reported to First Energy.

### **SOLICITATION**

It is unlawful to solicit within the city without first obtaining a solicitor's permit from the Police Department. Those who have obtained a solicitor's permit may solicit within the City of Mentor between 9 AM and 7 PM. It is unlawful to solicit at any premise at which a "No Solicitors" sign is displayed. "No Solicitors" signs are available at the Mentor Police Department or from the receptionist desk at City Hall. A printable version is available the Ordinances page of the city

# **MEACO MAKES LOANS PERSONAL**

Working with MEACO will not only benefit your business but will benefit your entire community.

The Mentor Economic Assistance Corporation (MEACO) is designed to help further economic growth as a tool for resources for gap financing for small businesses in the area and has been serving Mentor and Lake County residents since 1983.

MEACO is a certified development company (CDC) ran out of the Mentor Municipal Center. Being a CDC, they are certified by the federal government to run SBA 504 programs anywhere!

MEACO was established in 1983, but today's renewed success is driven by Executive Director Kelly Conrad. MEACO offers a Micro-enterprise Revolving Loan program which offers borrowers up to \$50,000 with at a current interest rate of only 4% with no prepayment penalties or application fee. This loan program is only available for brick-and-mortar businesses located in Mentor.

MEACO also prides itself on its SBA 504 loan program which offers an exceptionally low fixed interest rate. The loan is structured with a conventual lender underwriting 50% of a project, the SBA at 40%, and the borrower at 10% equity. The SBA 504 is not limited to Lake County businesses.

A unique benefit of going through MEACO is the personal connection made between the business and the lender.

"You get more of a personal relationship I think because it's just me. I do everything from taking the application, to the underwriting, to the servicing," said Conrad. "Being government, working for the city and knowing government programs, we can layer those with loans which is a big benefit to our clients as well, having the knowledge of what other programs we can put in with the funding that they need."

Another advantage to working with a smaller CDC like MEACO is that there is no backlog and loans are closed at a quicker rate than any large CDC.



"Our last loan closed in less than 30 days. That's practically unheard of for an SBA," said Conrad.

Through the years, MEACO loan programs have helped create over 2,000 jobs in the city of Mentor, with over \$27 million brought into our community.

# **MENTOR COMMISSIONS HOUSING STUDY**

In early 2023, the City of Mentor established the need to conduct a study to evaluate Mentor's housing market and identify gaps in our existing housing stock.

The project began in September 2023 with the creation of a resident survey as well as stakeholder interviews which allowed our consultant to engage with the community, and grasp Mentor's true housing concerns and objectives. From that point, they went into a "deep dive" evaluating Mentor's housing inventory, demographics, and current economic conditions, to better identify the gaps in the city's housing market and formulate specific strategies for the city to consider.

The outcomes of the study are intended to guide the city's housing development policies, striking a balance between future growth, and retaining the desired character of the Mentor community.


# MENTOR FIRE DEPARTMENT FALL SAFETY CHECK LIST

# **ARE YOU PREPARED FOR THE NEXT STORM?**

The storm that raced through Northeast Ohio on August 6th spawned several tornadoes and caused significant power outages throughout northeast Ohio including right here in Mentor. Although crews scrambled around the clock to restore service, much of the city was without power for upwards of five days.

September is National Preparedness Month and now is the ideal time to prepare for the next storm.

### **MAKE A PLAN**

Knowing what you and your family will do during an emergency is important. Discuss how you will communicate with each other and receive information should your cell phone die or you have no access to news.

### **BE PREPARED**

Assemble a preparedness kit including bottled water, nonperishable food, and other necessary supplies like medications, first aid supplies, flashlights, an emergency radio, and blankets.

Consider purchasing a generator for potential long-term outages and learn how to properly use it.

### DO YOUR HOMEWORK

Is your home covered against potential disasters? Know what your insurance will cover if you need to make repairs and know who to call. Now is also a good time to ask family and friends about reputable contractors instead of after a storm.

### **SUBSCRIBE TO WENS**

The City of Mentor utilizes Lake County Ohio's Wireless Emergency Notification System (WENS) to help keep residents informed during emergencies and other events in our city. Sign up takes less than 60-seconds. Do it today at **lakeohioalert.com**.

Last month's storm caught everyone by surprise but one thing we can predict is that another damaging storm will be on its way. Winters can be harsh here on the northcoast and its best to be ready. Take the time this September to plan and prepare.

# **UNDER**CONSTRUCTION

### **SEPT - NOV 2024**

### 2024 ROAD PROGRAM

This annual program will resurface or repair approximately 20 asphalt and concrete neighborhood streets throughout the City. In 2024, the City will invest roughly \$1.5 million in resurfacing and repairing local roads.

### **2024 SIDEWALK PROGRAM**

This annual program will replace deficient concrete sidewalk slabs in Ward 1 (Zones D and E) through an assessment process that were not replaced by property owners as a result of 2023 inspections by the City. These zones consisted of 17.6 miles of sidewalk. The sidewalk inspections found roughly 2,300 slabs of sidewalk to be deficient and in need of repair or replacement.

### **HOPKINS ROAD RESURFACING**

This project consists of milling and resurfacing the asphalt pavement on Hopkins Road from Plains Road to Lakeshore Boulevard. The total investment in this project is \$468,000 of which half will be covered by OPWC.

### **MENTOR MARINA DOCK ROAD**

This project consists of rehabbing the access road in certain areas. The total investment in Marina Road Rehabilitation will be about \$225,000.

### OTHER PARKING LOT RESURFACINGS

Blackbrook Golf Course, Krueger Park, Cemetery Road, and Civic Center Path behind the Ice Arena.

# PLASTIC POLLUTION IN OUR GREAT LAKES

According to the Rochester Institute of Technology, 22 million pounds of plastics enter the Great Lakes each year, which accounts for 90% percent of the litter profile on our beaches.

Scientists have found plastic in every living organism they have studied from our largest creatures, whales, to the smallest, zooplankton. Large pieces of plastic frequently entangle animals like snakes, birds, and marine and land mammals.

In Ohio, the most common items entangling our wildlife are fishing line, nets, and landscape mesh. Microplastics (plastic pieces that are 5mm or smaller) are being found in the gut contents of birds, fish, mammals and even humans.

The most commonly found microplastics in organisms are plastic fibers from our synthetic clothing such as fleece jackets or other polypropylene materials.

A plastic littered planet does not need to be the norm. If we use less plastic and use more reusable items instead of disposable items, plastics, and more importantly, single-use plastics, we can make a difference together.

We are the solution to plastic pollution. It is time we work together to move away from single use plastics and a throwaway society and move towards sustainable living and improved waste management practices.

PÓLITICAL OFFICE

Election season is in full swing and the City has received a number of inquiries related to what is and what isn't permitted related to political yard signs. The City's sign ordinances allow for the following:

- One ground sign per development unit (your yard) may be displayed year-round.
- During the election cycle, additional ground signs are permitted up to, but not more than, the total number of candidates and ballot issues for which a voter in the City may cast a ballot.
- Yard signs are limited to a maximum of 15 square feet.
- Yard signs may not be illuminated.
- No signs are permitted to be placed in the public right of way, including tree lawns.
- Signs cannot be posted within 15 feet of a side lot line.
- Temporary signs are not permitted on commercial properties where a ground sign already exists.

Sign content is protected under the First Amendment. Although a message may be considered disagreeable, it is a matter of free speech. Signs are also considered personal property. Trespassing, as well as theft and/or destruction of yard signs are punishable offenses.

Let's continue to respect each other's right to free speech as well as property for the duration of this election season.



The inaugural Headlands Birding Festival will take place September 20 – 22, 2024, at Headlands Beach State Park. The event will celebrate the fall migration of bird species as they travel to their wintering grounds as far away as South America.

The Headlands / Mentor Marsh region hosts some of the highest diversity and volume of migratory birds in the state, with 352 species documented in Lake County.

Bird experts will lead field trips to some of the region's best migratory bird hotspots as well as a boating 'pelagic' on Lake Erie. There will be presentations on bird identification, migrations, and related topics.

Jim McCormac, author of 'Birds of Ohio' and renowned nature photographer will give a keynote speech at the Springbrook Gardenhouse on Friday night. Greg Miller, known for breaking the record for most bird species seen in North America in a single year, will give the keynote speech on Saturday night. Greg's recordbreaking year was adapted into the film "The Big Year" starring Jack Black and Owen Wilson. Participation from a wide range of experience levels is welcomed.
