In 1963, the residents of Mentor Village and Mentor Township voted to create the City of Mentor.

The first two decades of the City's existence was a busy time with a tremendous amount of growth and activity taking place. City Council and Administration worked hard to develop infrastructure and encourage economic investment, while also paying heed to quality-of-life amenities like parks and recreation facilities which would make Mentor an attractive place to live.

In fact, from 1976 to 1982, the City purchased what would become Garfield Park, Wildwood Cultural Center, the first Senior Center building, and began construction on our city center - the Civic Center complex which consists of the Mentor Municipal Center, Police Department, Fire Station 5, Municipal Court, and Civic Center Park. Civic Center opened, and the tennis courts, ballfields, and Mentor Civic Arena soon followed.

Just two of the original seven

Councilpersons remain from that influential group – James Struna and Lynne Mazeika. In a recent interview both reminisced about the construction of the Civic Center complex and count it among their proudest achievements. According to Mazeika, there was doubt about the feasibility of the Ice Arena due to cost and whether the facility would generate enough revenue to support the operation. build the facility narrowly passed and it was unveiled to the public during the It's Better in Mentor festival in September, 1982.

"I'm very proud. There was a tie vote on the lce Arena, and I broke the tie to have us build that...it's been a tremendous asset," Mazeika recalled.

The late Gene Elkin was hired by the City as the first facility manager and is credited with establishing many of the policies and programs that remain today. Elkin realized that for the arena to achieve success, they had to establish programs and events that would bring both residents and those living in the surrounding communities back to skate again and again.

A comprehensive lesson program, a youth hockey program, and aggressive marketing made the Arena a success.

In a 1997 interview shortly before he retired, Elkin shared his memories of opening day when he had just one employee that was hired only the week before.

"I had no help", he said with a laugh, "People were lined up out the door to come in and see the facility and skate. It was wild, I had no skate guards and as people came in - if they looked like they could skate - I put a jacket on them and told them to guard."

Things have gone smoother since the excitement of that opening day and use of the facility grew enough to require expansion. In 1984, a small Studio Rink was built and in 1998, a second regulation rink was constructed to meet the needs of Mentor's growing skating program.

Current Manager, Bill Furman, attributes the success of the arena to the many skaters and their families who have embraced the sport.

"For the past forty years, this arena has been home for generations of recreational and competitive skaters. The lessons learned, the accomplishments, and the friendships made, have been countless," said Furman, "We are privileged to have been a second home for so many people over the years and are looking forward to the next forty."

A FREE 40th Anniversary kickoff party will be held on Mentor Skate Day on Sunday, January 2, 2022, from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM.

The public is invited to join the celebration with an open skate session, as well as performances from the Intensity Synchronized Skating Team, Mentor Figure Skating Club, and members of Learn to Skate programs. There will be giveaways, prizes, and a DJ. A special ceremony with Mentor City Council and other special guests will take place at 1:15 PM followed by cake.

Skate rental is also free, but availability may be limited. All children ten and under must wear a helmet. A limited number of helmets are available at the facility, so children are encouraged to bring their own bike helmet.

YARD WASTE UPDATE

The 2021 Yard Waste Collection Program ends the week of December 13th. Residents with service through Waste Management can still set out 25 bags or bundles of yard waste through that week to be collected on your regular trash day. Curbside yard waste collection will resume in April 2022.

HOLIDAY CLOSINGS

Mentor City Offices will be closed on Friday December 24th in observance of Christmas. City offices will also be closed on Friday, December 31st in observance of New Year's Day.

HOLIDAY TRASH COLLECTION

If a holiday falls on a weekday, service will be conducted the day after your regular pick-up day. If the holiday falls on a weekend, your service will NOT be delayed. There will be NO DELAY in trash collection for the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

The holidays are a time for families and friends to gather together, but it's also a time of increased risk of fire. It may surprise you to learn that over 33% of decoration fires are started by candles and nearly 33% of Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.

The Mentor Fire Department offers a few simple tips to ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

- Choose holiday decorations that are flame resistant or retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other potentially flammable items. Keep children and pets away from lit candles. Extinguish candles when you leave the room or go to bed.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both. Replace any string lights with worn or broken cords, or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for the number of light strands you

can connect. Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so cords don't get damaged. Turn off all string lights and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

- Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched. Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents, or lights. Add water to the tree stand daily. Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it's dry. Dried-out trees should not be left in the home or garage.
 - Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop. Keep pot handles turned to the side or the back so children cannot pull them down.

KEEP FIRE HYDRANTS CLEAR

Residents and business owners are urged to assist the Fire Department by keeping clear access to their fire hydrants during heavy snowfalls. Shovel around your hydrant and be ready if an emergency occurs.

NO PARKING DURING SNOW EMERGENCY

A Snow Emergency is defined as that time when there has been an accumulation of snow, sleet, hail, or ice on any streets or roads. No parking is permitted on any city street during a Snow Emergency to allow plows to more easily clear the streets. A parking ban is automatically in effect when a snowstorm occurs. HERE COMES THE SNOW!

We want to remind everyone that it is the responsibility of the property owner or occupant to keep sidewalks in front of their property clear of ice, snow, or other nuisances. This helps protect pedestrians and school children who walk to school or a bus stop. In addition, remember that pushing snow or ice onto a public sidewalk or roadway is prohibited.

SHOVEL SMART

Many of us hire a plow company to clear the snow from the driveway while others still do it the oldfashioned way with a shovel. While shoveling is great exercise, it can also pose serious health risks like muscle strain, back issues and heart attacks.

Remember to shovel smart by stretching beforehand, dressing appropriately, and taking breaks when necessary. If you experience persistent shortness of breath, chest pain, weakness or excessive sweating - stop and get help immediately.

If you have elderly neighbors consider lending a helping hand to keep our sidewalks clear.

SAFE WINTER DRIVING The Public Works Department is responsible for maintaining approximately 500 lane miles of roadway, utilizing 15 - 20 plows for a routine snowfall, and as many as 40

trucks during a major snow event.

During a snowstorm, plows focus on the main roads to benefit the greatest number of motorists. Once the main roads are cleared and salted, side streets and cul-de-sacs are plowed.

During the winter months, motorists should give themselves extra time to reach their destination and slow down when snow is falling.

The Mentor Public Works Department takes pride in keeping our roads clear of ice and snow, please help them get the job done by slowing down and giving them room to operate.

Here's some more tips to get ready for winter driving:

Do a pre-winter checkup on your car. Check

the battery, wipers, and tires, to make sure they are winter road ready.

- Keep a winter emergency kit in your trunk with extra warm clothing, a flashlight, water, blankets that you can use if you get stranded
- Fill up your gas tank so you'll be prepared if you are on the road longer than expected.

If you are following a Mentor snowplow, please remember to keep a safe distance behind them. If you must pass, please use extreme caution. Blowing snow can cause reduced visibility and usually the unplowed road in front of the plow is worse than what is behind it.

Let's all stay safe this winter season!



PROTECT YOURSELF FROM PORCH PIRATES

Although consumers are always encouraged to shop local when they can, online sales are expected to be at or near all-time highs again this holiday season. With this increase in purchases and deliveries, experts expect to see an increase in porch piracy as well...but we're fighting back.

The Mentor Police Department has formed a special undercover detail to combat porch pirates. Officers will be operating throughout city neighborhoods utilizing a variety of tools including unmarked vehicles, surveillance equipment, and the use of bait boxes that contain GPS tracking units.

Porch piracy is a crime of opportunity. Thieves will often follow a delivery truck or simply cruise around an area looking for an attractive target. And, they are looking for high value items that they can flip quickly.

Mentor Police are doing what they can, but residents are reminded that taking precautionary steps to protect themselves is the first line of defense. Track your online orders, remove them from your porch as soon as they are delivered, and invest in security cameras. Finally, be a good neighbor and keep an eye out for each other. If you see a suspicious car, or a theft in progress, jot down the license plate and contact the police. A description of a suspect or their vehicle, a partial license plate, stolen property, and other factors can lead to arrest. Those convicted of misdemeanor theft in the City of Mentor can face up to six-months in jail, even for a first offense.

If you think you have been a victim of theft, contact the Mentor Police Department at (440) 255-1234 to report it.

HELP FOR LAKE COUNTY SENIORS

According to the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, one in five people in their service area is food insecure. In Lake County alone, the United Way reports that Lifeline's help referral hotline received 9,223 inquiries for food assistance in 2020. Inquiries for food rank first among all inquiries received.

LAKE COUNTY MOBILE FOOD PANTRY The Lake County Mobile Food Pantry was established during the pandemic to combat food insecurity by providing a box of fresh produce to qualifying, limited-income Lake County Seniors. Distribution occurs Tuesdays from 10:00 AM to 11:00 AM at the Laketran Park-n-Ride lot located at 8650 Market Street in Mentor and based on the ongoing need, will continue to operate through at least January 25, 2022.

Registration is required, and 100 spots are available per week. Lake County seniors, 60 years and older, may register by calling Lifeline at 2-1-1 or the Lake County Council on Aging at (440) 205-8111. Participants must certify annual gross household income is at or below \$25,759 for a household of 1 and \$34,839 for a household of 2. Income is self-declared; verification is not required. Pick-up is contactless. Volunteers place the box of produce in the recipient's car trunk.

Free transportation to the Lake County Mobile Food Pantry is available through Laketran's Dial-a-Ride service. Call Laketran Customer Service at (440) 354-6100 to arrange transportation to the produce pickup. Reservations can be made 1-12 business days in advance.

This program is made possible by a partnership between Avery Dennison, Lake County Council on Aging, Board of Lake County Commissioners Senior Services, Lifeline, RSVP of Lake County, and Greater Cleveland Food Bank.

MENTOR SENIOR CENTER

The Mentor Senior Center and the Greater Cleveland Food Bank also partner to offer monthly food distribution to limitedincome seniors in our area. Packages includes 90% produce such as apples, cabbage, greens, sweet potatoes, onions, carrots, oranges, and melons. The remaining 10% is usually bread, dairy, or frozen products.



packaged foods such as pasta and rice are included when available.

Preregistration is not required but please bring a photo ID as all participants will be registered on site. Participants must certify annual gross household income is at or below \$25,759 for a household of 1 and \$34,839 for a household of 2. Income is self-declared; verification is not required. First come, first served.

Upcoming distribution dates are as follows:

December 20 – 10 to 11 AM January 24 – 10 to 11 AM February 28 – 10 to 11 AM

Even if you receive food from other distributions, you may still come to the Senior Center if you meet the qualifications.

If your power goes out call the Illuminating Company's Automated Outage Reporting Line at (888) 544-4877. Doing so will allow the Illuminating Company to restore service that much quicker. Please do NOT call 911. Only call 911 to report a crime in progress, or a fire, or if an ambulance is needed.

NO ICE IS SAFE ICE

Mentor has 241 ponds, Lake Erie, and the Lagoons. They are beautiful in the winter but if you walk on the ice, one misstep can be the difference between enjoying the view and fighting for your life. Please stay off the ice this winter.

HELP PREVENT SEWER BACKUPS

Dispose of FOGs (fats, oils and greases) by allowing them cool and then placing in the trash instead of pouring down your sink. Hardened FOG can build up, causing unwanted clogs. MELTING SNOW IS STORMWATER TOO!

Winter snow puts a white coat over every surface that makes for beautiful photos and fun activities. But, as it melts, it can impact the environment. Standing and flowing water on the ground can pick up all kinds of debris. Pollutants such as dog waste, litter, and especially deicing salts and chemicals on the ground, find their way into nearby streams.

Follow these tips for managing your property for the winter stormwater season:

- When piling your snow after shoveling and plowing, choose locations where the snow will have the most opportunity to infiltrate instead of becoming stormwater runoff. Pile your snow in areas where you don't usually have ponding in the spring rains, on relatively flat areas, and away from sensitive areas like streams, ponds, and your private septic system if you have one.
- Use deicing chemicals and salts sparingly. Use only what you need to make your walkways and driveways safe. Again, avoid those sensitive areas near waterways.
- Help keep the nearest storm drains clean. Do not pile snow on

storm drains and make sure your plow service is not piling snow over the drains too.

- If possible wait until the spring for outdoor construction projects when you can establish new vegetation that will reduce soil loss and sediment runoff.
- Pickup your dog's waste that was left in the snow. Don't wait for a snow melt or spring to come around.
- Clear your downspouts, allowing for melting roof snow to flow and not collect at your foundation.
- Plan to improve balding or eroding areas on your property this spring. Plants like native grasses and meadow plants or native trees and shrubs can slow and stop erosion.


